Somewhere in Spain, along the route of *el Camino de Santiago*, there is a sign posted that says, "Sometimes we find ourselves in the middle of nowhere and sometimes in the middle of nowhere we find ourselves." I love the wordplay. I love the idea. I love that I am beginning to understand what it means.

I've always wanted to walk el Camino. I understand from the handful of folk I know who have journeyed the route that it is a marvelous spiritual venture. Those who do the entire walk will cover 500 miles and walk for 30-35 days straight. Some of the trail is challenging, other parts not. The pilgrims meet people from all corners of the earth and are enriched by those with whom they share the experience. There is much time to think along the way – to take in the quiet and to soak up the grandeur of God's creation. The experience often leads to new understandings of self and to one's connection to the world and faith. I have dreamed of walking it. Maybe one day. I think it's good to spend some time in the middle of nowhere.

I've felt a bit lately like I'm in the middle of nowhere. I love the line from the old song Wildwood Weed: "We thought it was kind of handy, take a trip and never leave the farm." (Never mind what the song's about — it's a great line!) Sometimes I don't have to go anywhere to feel like I'm in the middle of nowhere. At times life simply takes me there. It's not the same as venturing across Spain with intentionality but if I pay attention to my surroundings there are things to be learned about myself and my world and my relationship with God. I imagine you may know well what I'm talking about.

These past four months have felt to me a bit like wandering in the middle of nowhere. We've experienced death in our family. Rhonda has had an uncle and an aunt die this year and another beloved uncle of hers is in hospice care. Our son was hospitalized last month with serious complications and continues to have issues. We have been living in the midst of a world on pause because of

COVID-19. That has altered our ability to interact with one another as we normally do and that, in itself, has made so many of us feel as though we are alone in the middle of nowhere.

The most recent detour to the route I had planned to walk this year is that my younger brother entered hospice care last week. We all knew it was coming and we spoke fairly openly about it. I think we operated under the illusion that if we spoke honestly it might not occur. We were wrong. Karl has endured much in recent years and he has been a model of faith as he has confronted his disease. I am impressed by his faith and am moved by his willingness to trust God. I am a fan.

In it all, here in *the middle of nowhere*, I am learning to trust God in the same manner. I understand the only control I have in this is to believe God is in control. Karl has taught me to do so. I trust that is true. That is a decision of my faith. I am grateful. I don't feel so alone and I feel a bit like I'm back on the beaten path. I know God is good – all the time.

MAY PRAYER OF THE MONTH

At sunrise on Easter morning I stepped out my front door and shouted "Christ has risen! Christ has risen, indeed!" I knew other church members and other community members were outside doing the same thing, but none were close by and, frankly, I felt like a voice crying in the wilderness. Without our community, don't we all feel like we are wandering alone in a place that could be dangerous? That, of course, is why Drew and Brenda and so many others are working hard to connect us with other media. If you cannot figure out how to tune in and join the new worshipping experience, let someone know and maybe we can figure out a way to help. If you have a phone that can connect to the internet, you can get church services from several sources.

But, back to Easter, I have missed announcing that Christ Has Risen! this year, repeatedly, like we usually do during our Easter service. I found myself telling my dogs the week following the resurrection that Christ had risen. (If you have dogs or cats, you are *not* talking to yourself.) I still don't have it out of my system. Jubilation was stunted somehow because we couldn't wrap our congregation, extended families and friends around us. And, because of our concern for people who were very ill, their families who couldn't be with them, and the beleaguered hospital workers. And, because of our concern for the health of our country. Not just economical health, but it's cohesiveness and its spirit in overcoming adversity. Were any of you distracted from Easter by the pandemic, the isolation, the inflamed rhetoric?

We are what we are and no one knows us better than our Savior. His death ransomed us from our sins even thousands of years later. Let's all remind ourselves to celebrate Easter constantly. The phrase "We are Easter people" can have new depth for us because our jubilation has been quieter and lasted longer this year. Let Easter linger long enough to germinate inside us. Tend the renewed growth as you would any beautiful thing: faithfully, tenderly, and lovingly.

Father We deny our fear even to ourselves. Because of that denial, we don't turn to you for succor. Constant preoccupation with the panoply of images and information keeps our hearts uneasy and we miss occasions to celebrate you, only you. Forgive us, Father, for the ways we fail to express our thankfulness and adoration. Bless us, Father. Keep us safe and strong, committed in love and service to you. Help us eradicate the virus that appears to be controlling our life. Let all of us find some way to lift up those around us and bless the world by being your worthy agent. We pray for all who need our prayers for recovery from illness, for financial help for those who lost their jobs, for clarity of thought for those who can't handle stress and find themselves confused and worried, for those who feel themselves in danger from misdirected anger pervading the atmosphere near them. Bring new Christians to us Father, so we may embrace them as new brothers and sisters in Christ.

We pray all these things in your name.



What? You thought Easter was OVER? Not even close. Easter Sunday, which we celebrated quite a bit differently this year, happened on April 12th. But Easter Sunday is really just the BEGINNING of Easter! Easter is actually a season. The Eastertide season lasts 50 days from Easter Sunday through Pentecost Sunday, which, this year, falls on May 31st! I think we can all agree that one day out of a whole year is surely not enough time for us to celebrate the greatest event and the greatest gift of all time...Jesus resurrected! And I think you will all agree that this year's Easter Sunday felt like a bit of a letdown. But let us remember that this year, we might have experienced the most "true to Easter" Easter Sunday of our lives. We were huddled in our homes, much like the disciples were huddled in hidden places... unsure, afraid, confused, disappointed! The good news of Jesus' resurrection was only revealed to a few on that first Easter day. Most came to recognize Jesus, risen and alive, during the Eastertide season...those 50 days leading to Pentecost. All through the original Eastertide season, Jesus revealed himself to more and more people for really only two purposes, I think. First, to bring glory to God, and second, to prepare people for the work of proclaiming the Gospel to all the nations. I think we do just what the followers of Jesus did that first Easter season. They were afraid for their lives...waiting for the all-clear. They allowed themselves to feel their disappointment. They came together as brothers and sisters in Christ to share their stories of Jesus. They became still and quiet, not knowing what their next move should be. They listened for Jesus' instructions. They waited. They wondered. They healed. And then, one day, that first Pentecost, it all became clear! The Holy Spirit blew through that gathering place with a wind unmistakably from God! Tongues of fire lit above the heads of those gathered...those who were being anointed to carry on Jesus' work. And the Holy Spirit found a home in the hearts and souls of these believers. Peter stood up and preached a sermon that brought the people to their knees in repentance and that day over 3,000 were brought into the Kingdom of Heaven! Wow!

Like I said...I think maybe this is our time to do much of the same. As we await the all clear, let us feel and express our disappointment. Let us come together and share stories about how God has been faithful to us in the past. Let us be still and quiet, considering what God may be calling us to do. May we listen. May we wait. May we wonder. May we be truly healed, in every way. One day, it will all become clear! Let us spend this time looking for ways that God is showing up. Let us spend this time allowing God to transform us more into the image of Christ. Let us open our hearts, our minds, our hands, and our feet, to a renewed understanding and impartation of the power of the Holy Spirit.

Christ is RISEN! And we know that we will be resurrected as well. Glory to God! This is all great news! Maybe for the first time in our lives, we realize that this is too much good news to celebrate all in one day. That's how God works sometimes, don't you agree? We don't get instant answers...we are confused...we might even be angry...we try to make sense out of the difficult places in our lives...but then, like a rushing wind blowing through a gathering place, we realize anew that the important thing is that Jesus has risen...and so shall we! Happy Easter...still!
