December 2020. I'm glad to turn the page to the last month of this year, 2020. It's amazing to think of all that has occurred in the 11 months prior. We began this year on such a high. Brenda Church arrived in our midst, our first installed Associate Pastor, and we celebrated her installation in February. It was a glorious day filled with hopeful anticipation of where we were headed as a congregation. Our worship services were filled with visitors who added to our energy and served as a portent of good things to come. So many were attending fellowship events that the Long Range Planning Committee began to develop plans to expand the fellowship hall to accommodate more folk. First Presbyterian Church had good reason to be excited about the coming year!

Then an unwanted visitor arrived: COVID-19. Things had to change in response to this unknown virus in our midst. In March, we reluctantly shut things down worship, meetings, fellowship gatherings, hospital visits. We began to use the phrase "out of an abundance of caution" over and over. And we began to make decisions "out of an abundance of caution" to ensure the safety of all who call this place home. We figured it would last a few weeks and we'd be back in worship about Easter or shortly thereafter. We stayed home and carefully wore our masks. Trips were cancelled and plans were rearranged. Even visits to the doctor were put on hold. We quit eating out and stopped gathering for parades and civic events. We changed the way we do business. Still, we figured it wouldn't last too long and we'd all be back in the game.

That was March as it was all beginning. By now, I would imagine that most all of us know someone who has been ill with COVID or who has died due to the virus. We know the stories of those who have been so personally affected. It hurts. This unwanted visitor has made its presence known.

It is now December and the bit of normalcy that had begun to inch its way back into our lives is once again put on hold as our numbers locally, nationwide, and across the globe exceed our wildest expectations and push normalcy out the door once more. Thanksgiving and Christmas plans are being cancelled and families are creatively looking for alternative ways to celebrate this year that don't include all the traditions that make the holidays familiar to us. It seems we're being forced to take our place at the beginning. "Return to Go! Do not collect \$200" is the way Monopoly puts it. It's all enough to make us wish that 2020 was just a bad dream.

I'm sure you've probably seen many of the memes and expressions that creative folks have used to describe this past year. My favorite is one I saw on Facebook that reads simply, "If 2020 were a Slide." The photo depicts a young child at the top of the slide, readying to descend with great glee and excitement. The bottom of the slide is a giant cheese grater. Seems fairly accurate to me!

It's easy to get caught up in the despair of so much of this. I find myself having to struggle daily to keep my head up and my emotions intact. I have a good friend who asks often, "How is your soul?" I've been having a hard time lately putting a good spin on my answer. Maybe you have, too.

Then I remember – it's December. Advent comes. And with Advent, the promise of the Savior, the Word in flesh, Immanuel. God is with us. Most assuredly. Without question. It's Christmas. That is good reason to maintain hope in the promises of our faith. It's reason enough to turn the page of the calendar with excited anticipation of the New Year. John puts it this way: "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." (Jn. 1.5) Truth. That light remains. This year, more than I ever remember consciously doing before, I am going to focus on that star and follow it as if my life depends on it. I'm pretty sure it does. Let's journey there together.

Remember, we must prepare for the coming of the Christ child. Meet you in Bethlehem.



Did you notice our Chrismon Tree in the Sanctuary? What's a Chrismon?! Take a look at the windows at the top of each of the sanctuary windows and you will see some Chrismons.

Over the years, the Christmas tree has become a symbol of Christ as the "tree of life. The use of Chrismons to decorate Christmas trees is popular in many churches today. Chrismons were first developed in 1957 by Frances Kipps Spencer of Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Va. In an effort to create appropriate decorations for her church Christmas tree, Spencer fashioned centuries-old symbols into white and gold tree decorations. Spencer's Chrismons and similar designs are now used on Chrismon trees in churches of different denominations throughout the country. The lighting of the Chrismon tree often is incorporated with the hanging of the greens in some churches. "Chrismon" is a combination of the words "Christ" and "monogram," and means "symbols of Christ." Chrismons are gold and white, representing majesty and purity. Early Christians often worshipped in secret to avoid possible persecution and death. They developed certain symbols that were used to communicate with fellow believers and direct Christians to secret places of worship. Symbols that signified the believers' faith often adorned doors and buildings, and were included on items such as jewelry and household utensils.

A collection of popular Chrismons and their meanings are included below.

- Alpha and Omega: The first and the last letters of the Greek alphabet are used to signify that Christ is the beginning and ending of all things. This is mentioned in the Bible in Revelation 1:8.
- Anchor cross: The anchor cross originated in ancient Egypt and was adapted by the early Christians in the catacombs.
- Bell: A bell is often used to call people to worship. This Chrismon symbolizes the sounding forth of God's word and serves as a reminder that God should have first priority in our lives.
- **Bible**: an open Bible, which represents the word of God.
- Budded cross: The Budded Cross is symbolic of the young Christian who has just begun serving Christ. Like a bud, young believers are considered "immature Christians."
- Burning torch: reminds Christians to be witnesses for Christ.
- Butterfly: The butterfly is a symbol of Christ's resurrection and eternal life. Just as the butterfly emerges from its cocoon and flies upward with a new body, the followers of Jesus Christ are reborn and given a new life.
- Cup: symbolizes of the blood Jesus shed on the cross for our sins. The cup also reminds us of the sacrament of Holy Communion.
- Chi Rho: is a monogram of the first two letters of the Greek word from Christ Chi (X) and Rho (P).
- Christmas rose: a white, hardy rose that blooms at Christmastime. It is symbolic of the messianic prophecy and the nativity.
- **Circle and triangle**: symbolizes the eternity of the Trinity.
- Cross and crown: symbolizes a Christian's reward in heaven for being a faithful servant while living on earth. See
- Lion is a symbol for Jesus who is sometimes called 'The Lion of Judah'. Jesus is also represented as Aslan the Lion in the Chronicle of Narnia books by C S Lewis.
- Daisy: a popular symbol for the innocence of the Holy Child.
- Dove: symbol of purity and innocence. The dove also stands for the Holy Spirit, and is a reminder of the presence of God during the baptism of Jesus and hovering over the waters at creation.
- Epiphany star: represents the star of Jacob and the star that led the wise men to Jerusalem. See Numbers 24:17.

- Fish: The fish is a popular symbol of Christianity today. It was a secret symbol used by the early persecuted Christians to signify their belief in Jesus.
- Fleur de lis: symbolic of Virgin Mary.
- **Harp**: symbolic of music that praises God.
- Lamb: In the New Testament, Jesus is often referred to as "the sacrificial lamb."
- Lamp: The lamp stands for the word of God. See Psalm 119:105.
- Manger: reminds us to be humble, and represents the simplicity of the birth and life of Jesus.
- Shamrock: three leaves of the shamrock, or clover, stands for the Trinity Father, Son and Holy Ghost.
- Shell with drops of water: symbolic of Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist.
- **Trumpet**: The trumpet signifies a call to worship, the day of resurrection and the Day of Judgment.

In the ancient world, various peoples lit fires to mark the turning of the light into winter's season and to pray for the return of the light. The church has Christianized that practice in the lighting of the Advent wreath. To us, these candles are signs of the growing light of Christ who is coming again in all fullness into the darkness of our world. Until the dawning of that Great Day, we watch and wait in Holy Spirit for Christ's coming into the darkness of our world, lighting candles of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love; and remembering the promises of God with prayer.

Our church tradition is to have an advent wreath in our sanctuary. But since many of us are participating in online worship, you can find simple instructions for making your own Advent Wreaths online or you can purchase one. Traditionally, there are 5 candles. Hope (purple), Peace (purple), Joy (pink), Love (purple) and the Christ candle in the middle (white). But of course, you may use whatever you may have hand – real candles or battery-operated ones!

Presbyterians Today is offering an online devotional that continues through Christmastide (ending with Epiphany on January 6th). It can be found at: pcusa.org/2020advent. Feel free to use as much or as little of the devotional. The theme of this devotional is based on the following poem by Howard Thurman. Rev. Thurman was a Baptist pastor, theologian, and civil rights activist, was born in 1899. The grandson of a former slave, Thurman was named by Life magazine in 1953 as one of the 12 greatest preachers in the country. The pastor not only co-founded San Francisco's Church for the Fellowship of All Peoples in 1944 — the first interfaith and intercultural congregation in the United States — but he also mentored a young Martin Luther King Jr., who received his Ph.D. in 1955 at Boston University, where Thurman was serving as the first Black dean of Marsh Chapel.

A Pastoral Letter from the Session of First Presbyterian Church

Dear Members and Friends of First Presbyterian:

At its November 17 meeting, the Session voted to suspend in-person worship beginning Sunday, November 29, until *at least* Sunday, January 17. We will hold in-person worship this Sunday, November 22, as planned. We regret the necessity of making this decision but after reviewing trends in cases, hospitalizations and deaths, especially in neighboring counties, we determined that this was the correct course to take. You will note that the suspension begins immediately after Thanksgiving and is planned to end two weeks into the new year. Predictions are that holiday related travel and gatherings may pose significant additional risk.

Our concern has always been the health and safety of each person in our worshiping community. We did not make this decision without thoughtful and prayerful consideration. We had no idea when 2020 began how COVID-19 would impact each of our lives and how our community of faith would be challenged. During the past 8 months, your pastors and elders have dealt with matters we never dreamt would be on our agenda. Your gracious and faithful support has meant much to us during this time. We thank you.

We will continue to provide our online worship services in the weeks to come as we have since the beginning of this pandemic. You are encouraged to continue to worship with us via Facebook or YouTube. Our small groups and committees may continue to meet under the protocols Session adopted and approved earlier.

We will remain diligent in monitoring the situation and reviewing the advice of health professionals. Our hopeful prayer is that vaccines will become available to many of us by January 17 and the holiday surge will be behind us. May that be the prayer we each pray.

God is with us and the Christ Child makes his way as Advent approaches. That is always our hope and assurance.
