From the pastor

Who knows what the facts of Jesus' birth actually were? As for myself, the longer I live, the more inclined I am to believe in miracle, the more I suspect that if we had been there at the birth, we might well have seen and heard things that would be hard to reconcile with modern science. But of course that is not the point, because the Gospel writers are not really interested primarily in the facts of the birth but in the significance, the meaning for them of that birth just as the people who love us are not really interested primarily in the facts of our births but in what it meant to them when we were born and how for them the world was never the same again, how their whole lives were charged with new significance. Whether there were ten million angels there or just the woman herself and her husband, when that child was born the whole course of history was changed. That is a fact as hard and blunt as any fact. Art, music, literature, our culture itself, our political institutions, our whole understanding of ourselves and our world — it is impossible to conceive of how differently world history would have developed if that child had not been born. And in terms of faith, much more must be said because for faith, the birth of the child into the darkness of the world made possible not just a new way of understanding life but a new way of living life.

Frederick Buechner hits the nail on the head with these words. We don't know exactly what happened in the birth of Jesus. It seems to me wise and faithful to allow some mystery to stand. But we do know and we have experienced the significance of that birth in myriad ways. We profess our faith that this Jesus is God come to earth and dwelling in our midst. Call him *Word* or *Light* or simply *Mary's boy*, he remains the same.

The one who brings salvation gathers us even in his birth. The bringer of hope, peace, joy, and love calls us to follow and beckons us to live a life of compassion as he lived. His example guides and directs and inspires us to be who God has made us to be and who God intends for us to be. The significance of Jesus' incarnation is that God is birthed in our very lives in a manner unimaginable and yet in a manner that allows us to experience the very love God has for us.

That love, my friends, is a game changer and a life changer. It's why you and I are part of the community of faith. It's why we "do unto others." It's why we gather to worship. It's why we kneel to pray. It's why our heart sings at the glory of God's creation. It's why our heart breaks at the loss of one we love. Yet, it's why we continue to pronounce "Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!" even in the face of death. It's because the One who was present in the beginning is with us even in the ending. Is there a thing more *significant* than that?

It's Advent, and Christmas follows closely on Advent's heals. We prepare and we ready our hearts to receive the child who comes. May it be our prayer that this Christmas be *significant* in our world. God has made that so. May it also be *significant* in our hearts and in our lives as we experience the Christ born anew in us. May God make that so, too.

CRANBERRY CHUTNEY

15 oz can Pineapple tidbits drained (don't add until the end)

Drain the pineapple, saving juice. Add water to juice to make 1 cup liquid

1 bag cranberries

2 c sugar

1 c white raisons

1/4 t ginger

½ t cinnamon

1/2 t allspice

½ t salt



Simmer everything except the pineapple for 20-25 minutes. Then add the pineapple and 1 c chopped pecans. Chill. This is great at Thanksgiving or Christmas.
