When I was a kid, I worked at Gale's Texaco station on Hiway 87 in Tulia, Texas. Gale Stephens was the owner and worked with us there every day. He ran a real service station. We hustled as soon as a car pulled in to meet the customer and asked, "Regular or Ethel?" We washed windshields and checked the oil. We often checked tire pressure. We embodied Texaco's motto: "You can trust your car to the man who wears the star!" It was my first real job, and I learned much about caring for the customer. We really were a "service" station.

We don't see many businesses like that anymore. Last week, on a trip to return the grandkids to their parents, we stopped at McDonald's to get breakfast. There was no one behind the counter. Rather, there were two kiosks out front with the menus posted. You scroll through the options to place your order. We got it all correct finally and then pushed the big button that said "Pay." I wanted to pay with cash. Silly me, that wasn't an option at the kiosk – you had to use a card. I grumbled and paid out, took a table tent with number 25 and sat at a table to wait for my order to be delivered as I had been instructed to do by the instructions on the kiosk.

A few minutes later, another customer leaned over my table and said, "I think that's your order on the counter." I had ordered to eat at the restaurant; they sacked it all up as a "to go" order. No one called out the number. No one shouted, "Order up!" They just set it on the counter and went back to their business. The only human interaction I had in the place was with the customer who was waiting for his automated order.

On the way home, we stopped at Walmart where they have rearranged their check out area to accommodate more self-serve stations. There were many, many customers but only two clerks checking people out. Everyone else was busy checking and bagging their own groceries and pushing their carts out to the car where they will load the car and leave the cart in the middle of a parking space for someone else to put away. Oh well, I paid out, pulled up to the self-serve gas pumps, filled up my own car, washed my windshield, and headed home.

That afternoon, we decided to go to a movie. I figured it might save time to buy tickets online so we'd be sure to get a seat. I got online, found the movie, went through the process of picking out our seats and pushed "Continue" to purchase our tickets. Senior tickets were \$7.50 apiece so I had already used my razor sharp mind to determine that I'd owe \$15.00. I was surprised when the total came out to be \$21.53. Apparently, tax is added post purchase now along with a "Service Convenience Fee" of \$5.25 for the privilege of doing all the work to purchase your own tickets. Seems like that "Service Convenience Fee" ought to go to me — I did all the work, and they got all the convenience.

As I read what I've written, I realize I sound like a grumpy old guy bemoaning the changing of the world about me. I sound like my father – he'd be proud. It's a self-serve world we live in and a touch free culture. I'll try to get used to it when I do business around town. That said, I think it's a lousy way to do church. Church is not self-serve. It's about serving others of God's children and doing so in the name of Jesus Christ. It's about service we provide for others because that is our calling. Let's not lose sight of that.

Have you ever encountered a Scripture passage that is very familiar to you...but just as you are preparing to skim right over it...something new hits you: a new insight...a new thought...a new perspective? I don't know for sure, but I really believe Lazarus had a choice. God rarely forces anything on God's people. Still, Lazarus was called forth for God's purposes...so he came out of that tomb. I have never forgotten this insight, and it has colored my discernment from time to time. Sometimes, just when life seems so comfortable, God shakes things up. It is then that we have to make our choice...do we stay in our comfort...or do we step outside into the fray? It's a good thing to consider.

My recent DMin class provided an opportunity to commit my musings on this passage to poetry. I hope my creative imagination on this passage of Scripture proves meaningful to you. I hope it inspires you to look for the unexpected in Scripture as well! God's Word is so rich and so very alive...and it's right in front of us for the pondering!

How did you become interested in playing the organ?

I wanted to study with a particular teacher, Devon Howard, upon my return to the U.S. after living in Austria. I had studied classical piano with

Lucio Maier at the University of Regensburg and wanted to direct my studies in a more practical direction.

What is your favorite piece to play?

Playing the music of J.S. Bach is an experience difficult to describe in words. Especially the fugues. Technically, they are quite challenging, but the most rewarding.

Who is your favorite composer?

I enjoy anything that expands my perspective as a musician. In undergrad, I focused a lot on medieval keyboard music. Bach is a lot of fun to play, and I also enjoy the color modern composers use to build interest.

What's the best concert you've ever been to?

Picking a single concert is far too difficult, but this year I've really enjoyed following the Van Cliburn competition as well as attending alt-J, Jacob Collier, and Lady Gaga's Jazz and Piano residency in Las Vegas. Vadym Kholodenko's (2013 Cliburn gold medalist) recital at TCU and Paganini's 24 Caprices performed on viola were super impressive. I also try to stay active within the Fort Worth AGO.

What do you do for work when you're not playing our organ?

I'm Chief Scribe for Harris Southwest Emergency Room. My team of about 40 pre-health students provides non-clinical support so the providers can acutely focus on excellent care.

When is your birthday and what are your favorite flavors of cake and ice cream?

November 23. A warm, gooey chocolate chip cookie sandwich filled with peanut butter ice cream sounds amazing. I guess that also confirms my affinity for Reese's peanut butter cups.

Would you like to share something about your family?

I grew up near Cleburne on a few acres with horses, cows, and a rotating menagerie of other animals. My parents still live there and welcomed a new litter of toy Australian Shepherds last week. My brother works at an avionics facility in Arlington.

What's the best way to start the day?

What's your favorite movie of all time?

I enjoy a wide variety of films but if I had to settle with one, I'd go for BBC's Sherlock series with Benedict Cumberbatch and Martin Freeman.


