am amazed at the things children say. I think we dismiss kids as, well, just kids, and we don't often grant them the attention they deserve. We don't listen to what they have to share. Kids not only say the "darnedest things" – sometimes they say the most profound things.

A recent Facebook memory from my eldest daughter reminded me of the conversation she and her then four-year-old daughter were having shortly after my mother died. Britton asked, "Gracie, what do you think Nanny is doing up there with God right now?" Gracie thought for moment and then responded: "I think she's dancing . . . while God strums a guitar." Gracie loved her grandmother and she understands a bit about the hope of the resurrection.

Then, again, at times kids aren't just profound – they are straight up honest! Today Britton posted a beautiful early morning shot of Pike's Peak. She apparently took the photo while she stood in the street waiting for the bus to arrive and pick up her youngest son. While she stood in traffic taking her shot, Declan yelled out to her saying, "MOMMMMMM, you're going to get hit by a car and not be able to actually enjoy those pictures if you don't get out of the street!" I wonder where he might have heard that advice before? He was right, even if he was repeating information some adult had imparted to him. I love kids. We need to listen to them.

Going through a stack of children's books recently, I found an old and ragged copy of "The Little Red Hen." I haven't thought of that story in years. It's a kid's book, after all, and we haven't had kids around the house in a long time. Well, haven't had our own kids around the house. Grandkids get cooler books these days than our kids had!

Anyway – The Little Red Hen. Remember it? The little hen finds some seed and asks her friends – a dog, a cat, and a yellow duck – to help her plant. No one wants to help so she does it by herself. When the stalks of wheat grow, she asks her friends again to help her gather the grain. No one wants to help so she does it by herself. When it comes time to grind the grain to flour, again she asks her friends to help but she gets no takers. Once more, she does it all herself. She moves the sack of freshly milled wheat to the barn with no help from her friends. The little hen then decides to use the flour to bake a cake and asks her friends to help her bake. You guessed it, no one was willing to help her bake the cake.

When she pulled the delicious confection out of the oven, she turned to her friends and asked who would like to help her eat the cake. Each of them – the dog, the cat, the yellow duck – enthusiastically jumped to their feet and exclaimed that they'd love to help her eat the cake. The little red hen then reminded that no one wanted to help her do the work so she believed she wouldn't let them eat the cake – and she ate it all herself.



It's a children's story. It's not a very happy children's story, but the tale is spun for the benefit of children. Like some of the things kids say to adults, children's books can speak to us oldsters also. If you want a piece of cake, you have to do the work to see that the job gets done. The cake doesn't bake itself and there's a lot of prep work that goes on behind the scenes.

We Do Church Together. We adopted that as our unofficial motto around here a few years ago. It still holds true. We've always done the work of being the Church together. We're needing some help right now – to prepare for the Rummage Sale, to teach Sunday School to our children, to answer the call to serve as elders in our church. The first Sunday in October is designated as World Communion Sunday, which celebrates our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world.

World Communion Sunday (originally called World Wide Communion Sunday) is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger ecumenical church. The first celebration occurred at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, in 1933. It was their attempt to bring churches together in a service of

Christian unity—in which everyone might receive both inspiration and information, and above all, to know how important the Church of Jesus Christ is, and how each congregation is interconnected one with another.

Celebration of World Wide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church in 1936. Churches in other denominations were invited to celebrate with us from the beginning, but it wasn't until 1940 when the Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches (a predecessor body of the National Council of Churches) promoted extending the celebration to a number of churches around the world that the practice became widespread.

Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods.

Items we will need for 0 to 12 months:

Diapers, Pajamas, Socks, Pacifier, Small soft toy/taggy blankets, Interactive toy, and Teether toy

For 2T to 3T:

The list is basically the same as above with the exception of pull ups instead of diapers. When purchasing stuffed animals and toys please remember <u>all of this must fit in a gallon size</u> storage bag so think small.

The next group I would like for us to help with again is the 10-15 year old group: T shirts, Soft shorts, Underwear, Socks, and Stuffed animals.

Toiletry bags:

Deodorant, Toothbrush, Toothpaste, Shampoo, Conditioner, Soap, Lotion, Lip balm, Flashlight, Comb/hairbrush, Shower sponge, Nail clippers, and Emery board.

All of these supplies should be small. This is a good time to get rid of all the hotel bottles that you brought home from a trip and never used. Everything should be travel size.

We will have more information as the time gets closer but wanted to give you the list so you can start looking for items. Thank you so much for your support.

I just found a new crockpot recipe and it was so easy and delicious! You might want to try it.

Crockpot Salisbury Steak

4 pre-formed hamburger patties – place in bottom of crockpot

Add salt and pepper, a little Montreal Steak Seasoning, ½ cup chopped onions, and 1 cup sliced mushrooms. (If you don't have fresh mushrooms, add canned ones when meat is almost done.) Mix ¼ cup flour with 1 cup beef broth and stir or shake till well mixed. Pour this over the top of the meat. Cook on high 4 hours.
