ovember is a month for giving thanks and gratitude, both as Americans and as followers of Christ. On the fourth Thursday of every November, we celebrate the national holiday of Thanksgiving. Typically, Thanksgiving Day is a day when we watch football games non-stop for several hours, overindulge by eating too much turkey and pumpkin pie, and for many to develop their plan of attack for Black Friday shopping,

But the Fruit of the Opirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

During the Session retreat, we examined how we glorify God and show the 'fruit of the spirit' within the works of our church. Each month, a different elder will write about his or her faith in action and what is being done within his or her committee.

Long-Range Planning: Elder in charge - Terry Worcester

I began looking for what the Fruit of the Spirit means and what it means to Christians. Here is what I found and it was a beautiful journey for me. I hope it enlightens you as well.

Christ said we are known by our fruit, so what is the good fruit to aspire to? The Apostle Paul mentions the "fruit of the Spirit" that Christians should work to cultivate in their heart and mind. I understand Paul wanted us to think like Christians and he made it simple by referring to what basic values we should each have. I call these "basic" but really in each of their own definition, they should be called "essential" to our Christian values.

Love denotes an undefeatable benevolence and unconquerable goodwill that always seeks the highest good for others, no matter their behavior. It is a love that gives freely without asking anything in return and does not consider the worth of its object. To me, Love is the purist of all feelings. It cannot be measured or changed. In essence, it means you give your whole heart. You give your feelings easily, and without compromise.

Joy is intense and especially ecstatic or exultant happiness, or an instance of such feeling. To me, joy is a happiness that is uplifting to the soul and your present state of mind. So I take it that like "Joy to the World" song would mean happiness to the world and all that is a part of it.

Peace is the absence of war or other hostilities. An agreement or a treaty to end hostilities. Freedom from quarrels and disagreement; harmonious relations. To me, peace is the feeling that one gets when everything goes right and your inner soul seems to be in good spirit and no pressures of any kind are on one's mind.

Patience is "slow to anger and rich in kindness and fidelity." The quality of being patient, as the bearing of provocation, annoyance, misfortune, or pain, without complaint, loss of temper, irritation, or the like.

Kindness one of the most acts, I wish the world had more of. By definition it is the state or quality of being kind; good will; benevolence; beneficence of action or manner. Giving to another and not expecting anything in return. It comes from within our soul, it cannot be duplicated or summoned, it just exists within us. I love this word and I would hope it defines me. There is nothing more fulfilling than an act of kindness.

Goodness The state or quality of being good, in any sense; excellence; purity; virtue; grace; benevolence. Goodness in man is not a mere passive quality, but the deliberate preference of right to wrong, the firm and persistent resistance of all moral evil, and the choosing and following of all moral good.

Faithfulness I love this word and in its essence it is allegiance, attachment, commitment, constancy, dedication, devotedness, devotion, faith, fastness, fealty, fidelity, loyalty. This word as faith alone means to trust and pledge our heart to without having to see it with our own eyes but what we feel in our own soul.


Gentleness Sensitivity of disposition and kindness of behavior, founded on strength and prompted by love. Examples- The New Testament. That king, now come in the flesh, is "gentle and humble in heart." (<u>Matt 11:29</u>)

Self Control - Control of one's emotions, desires, or actions by one's own will. I would think biblically it means: While we cannot control every circumstance in our lives, we can control how we respond to the circumstance or the situation. Self-control helps us respond in the correct way that honors God and brings Him glory.

I hope this article has touched your life in a positive way today. I hope it brings an awareness in a way that each of these most important fruits of the spirit rest within your soul.

C C'S CARRYON'S

C C"s Carryon's is an organization that supplies 1st night bags to children that have been taken from their homes and placed in foster care. Usually they have no items with them when they leave their home. Unfortunately, this has been a bad year and their supplies of the 1st night bags are very depleted. Our FUN Circle has supplied them with 1st night bags for several years. The FUN Circle will be collecting items and making 1st night bags in January. If you are out shopping and come across some great sales take advantage of them. We have a spot in the admin building where you can drop these items off if you don't want to keep them at your house.

Items we will need for 0 to 12 months:

Diapers, Pajamas, Socks, Pacifier, Small soft toy/taggy blankets, Interactive toy, and Teether toy

For 2T to 3T:

The list is basically the same as above with the exception of pull ups instead of diapers. When purchasing stuffed animals and toys please remember <u>all of this must fit in a gallon size</u> storage bag, so think small.

The next group I would like for us to help with again is the 10-15 year old group: T shirts, Soft shorts, Underwear, Socks, and Stuffed animals.

Toiletry bags:

Deodorant, Toothbrush, Toothpaste, Shampoo, Conditioner, Soap, Lotion, Lip balm, Flashlight, Comb/hairbrush, Shower sponge, Nail clippers, and Emery board.

All of these supplies should be small. This is a good time to get rid of all the hotel bottles that you brought home from a trip and never used. Everything should be travel size.

We will have more information as the time gets closer but wanted to give you the list so you can start looking for items. Thank you so much for your support.

ORANGE TAPIOCA FRUIT SALAD

- 1 pkg. tapioca pudding (not instant)
- 1 (3 oz) pkg. orange Jell-O
- 1 pkg vanilla pudding (not instant)
- 3 cups hot water
- 1 can mandarin oranges drained
- 1 can chunk pineapple drained



Blend hot water with tapioca, orange Jell-O and vanilla pudding. Bring to boil but do not cook longer than that. (I stir mine several times while it is coming to a boil to keep it from sticking to the bottom of the pan.) Cool.

Add oranges and pineapple and store in frig until serving.
