n the wake of the devastating wildfires that hit the island of Maui in Hawaii, many of us are more aware of disaster relief efforts, but we may not fully appreciate the work our Presbyterian churches are doing to help in other situations all over the world.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is currently working to assist in Ukraine helping as 1/3 of the population has been displaced due to 8 years of increasing Russian aggression that has escalated into all-out war for the past two years. PCUSA has contributed \$8 million to Ukraine during this time.

What we probably are unaware of is the many other situations all over the world where our contributions are working to alleviate the suffering of God's children: Pakistan has experienced catastrophic flooding. The Philippines was hit with Typhoon Rai. India is experiencing the Kerala Floods. Cyclone Freddy in Malawi, Madagascar and Mozambique has displaced more than two million people.

All over Latin America and the Caribbean Islands hurricanes Ian, Iota, Eta, Laura, Dorian, Irma, Fiona, and Maria have impacted our neighbors.

An explosion in Beirut, Lebanon, an earthquake affecting Turkey and Syria, measured 7.8 on the Richter Scale.

Fourteen million men, women, and children in Yemen are starving due to repeated outbreaks of diseases, especially cholera.

The new nation of South Sudan is dealing with 4 million displaced persons, and tornadoes here within the continental USA have left our brothers and sisters homeless and helpless.

We can be proud of the work being done in Christ's name by our monetary contributions, but there are other ways to help as well through *Presbyterian Disaster Assistance*. There are mission trips to allow personal awareness and assistance. We can sign up to stay informed about the needs of our brothers and sisters throughout the world by signing on to the Rapid Information Network on the website. Prayers of the people include those we know already and those whose needs are just as great, even if we have never met them.

Once the above pudding is made, combine it with a large tub of Cool Whip, 8 oz of Whipping Cream (whipped), and 12 oz of sour cream.

You will also need 8 ripe bananas and 2 boxes of Vanilla Wafers

Layer cookies, pudding mixture, and bananas in that order. Repeat. Top with cookies. This takes a big pan – bigger than a 9X13. Chill untill serving time.



tewardship is commonly defined as the prudent and responsible guardianship of something generally of great value which has been entrusted to one's care. For Christians, stewardship is about recognizing and appreciating the bountiful gifts we have all received from God and what we should do with them in service to Him as His stewards. There are various citations of biblical scripture that emphasize this point. For example, "Like good stewards of the grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received." (1 Peter 4:10 NRSV).

What gifts have we received from God? The short answer is everything, beginning with the giving of His Son to die on the cross for us. Knowing that God created our world and everyone and everything in it is the foundation of our faith as Christians and by extension Christian stewardship. As scripture tells us, "The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world, and all those who live in it." (Psalm 24:1 NRSV).



Outreach and Mission



ummer is over, and hopefully it will begin to cool down. The Outreach & Mission Committee is already planning our Thanksgiving and Christmas outreach projects for the residents of the Housing Authority. For Thanksgiving, residents sign-up to receive a turkey and food to prepare side dishes. Last year we provided 42 meals and expect close to that same number again this year. We were fortunate last year that People Helping People provided us with the food for the side dishes, and we are hopeful they can do that again this year. We also include Advent calendars and puzzle books along with the food.

Our plans for Christmas are to provide hams and a "soup in a jar mix" for those residents who sign-up. All residents are given a Christmas bag filled with goodies, i.e., hand lotion, flashlight, socks, lip balm, kitchen towels, dish cloths, potholders, hot chocolate mix, cookies, and mixed nuts. Families are also given popcorn tins and a family game. We also plan to make Christmas wreaths.

If anyone has a hobby or talent that they would like to share with us in completing these projects, we will be more than happy to have your input. You will be hearing more about this as we finalize plans and begin work.

MISSION SPOTLIGHT-PEOPLE HELPING PEOPLE (PHP)

People Helping People was established by the Lake Granbury Ministerial Alliance in 1983. There are no paid employees working with this agency, only volunteers. The Board of Directors is composed of representatives from various churches. FPC Granbury members Saunya Bishop and Meg Moore currently serve on the PHP Board of Directors. PHP's mission since its inception has always been to help anyone who has fallen on difficult times.

People Helping People is the oldest and largest food bank in Hood County. PHP purchases about 7,000 pounds of food a week through the Tarrant Area Food Bank. Food distribution occurs on Tuesday, Thursday, and the first Saturday of each month to approximately 150-200 families on a weekly basis.


There are two resale areas where some of the donated clothes, furniture, and household items are made available to the public. Proceeds from the resale areas help pay for food needed for distribution. The Resale Areas are open Tuesdays, Thursdays, and the first Saturday of each month (weather permitting) from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Donations of food and almost any gently used items (except mattresses) are accepted on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays between 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m.
