

Pastor's Pen...

Have you ever had one of those days when no matter what you tried to do, and no matter how hard you tried to do it, nothing seemed to go right? I have plenty of these days. Perhaps you recall a day that goes something like this: I sent the dog out to do her morning job: picking up the paper at the sometimes remote end of the driveway and/or desired front door. While I left her to retrieve the paper, I did what I do on most mornings: I multi-tasked. I placed a bagel in the toaster and went back to the front door. My dog and the paper were not back. I stepped partially outside of the house to see my dear and beloved dog dancing in the rain (with my newspaper). At this same time, I started to smell a fire—in the kitchen. The bagel was lodged in the toaster and smoking like a new piece of wood.

As I turned on the hair dryer to dry the paper—I noticed on the news a commentary on "taking time to pamper yourself." Yeah right—like that's going to happen today, I thought to myself. With the crinkly and wrinkled paper in hand, I continued on with my morning. In the car on the way to pick up a curb-order at Walmart, I realized that I was missing something—my morning devotion. I had not taken any time in the haste to read God's Word for the day—let alone prepare myself to share it.

Distractions are a part of everyday life. Distractions are very normal. Many people put off something

that brings them joy (ie. Reading God's Word, Morning Devotions, and Listening to God) just because they haven't "thought about it, don't have it on their schedule, didn't know it was coming or are too rigid to depart from their routine." The same anonymous email philosopher says in an online email "Americans cram so much into their lives, they tend to schedule their headaches. Americans live on a sparse diet of promises that we make to ourselves to do something when all of the conditions are perfect" (<u>www.communitycomcast.net</u>). We place conditions on serving God when the time is more convenient. We promise to read the Bible when our laundry is dried. We promise to seek God's justice—when it makes more "sense" to us.

Martha, Martha/People, People, Jesus says to us in Luke 10: 38-42 you and I have our priorities messed up. *When was the last time that you, like Mary of Bethany, sat quietly at Jesus' feet? When was the last time that you spent time listening to God?* Ministry loves company. God loves your company.

Martha was preparing for company—she was getting ready to entertain to the haste of our busy lives. her friend Jesus. Maybe she wanted things to be perfect. Perhaps she wanted the cushions on her eggplant colored couch to be clean and fluffy. Maybe Martha wanted fresh flowers in a vase in the center of the table. Or, fresh flowers in the yard around the house. She wanted crisp linens on the table, and her nicest stoneware set for the meal. Then, she wanted those dainty little hand-made doilies that we pay a fortune for today. Of course, Martha wanted the meal to be just perfect, too. Lamb kabobs with lentils, homemade honey and cream, fresh fruit cups, and aromatic tea. It is easy to relate to Martha—how many of us have prepared for company days, maybe weeks, prior to our guests' arrival? By the time the guests come—we are tired, distracted, and miss the meaning of the whole visit. *How many of us go to great lengths to have the appearances of perfection in our homes and our lives*?

Martha, Martha—poor Martha. *How are you like Martha? What are the distractions that keep you from focusing on God?* Laundry? Working? Sports? Carting kids around the states to sporting events? Self-focus on health problems? It is likely that we are so busy—whether we are children, college-aged, middle-aged, seniors, or retired—that we do not take time to make room for God in the houses

of our hearts. Ministry loves company—and yet we don't give God any of our company. *Isn't it possible that we busy ourselves with hundreds of small tasks—to keep ourselves from feeling the weight of the real task: getting closer to God?*

A Presbyterian Missionary in Ghana has devoted his entire life to God. And yet, he, this devoted Mission servant, struggles to be Mary. Glen Hallead writes (May 21, 2007 <u>www.pcusa.org/</u><u>missionconnections</u>): "Another day, more counseling with missionaries here in Ghana struggling with the question of whether their ministry is worth the trouble. No sense of personal accomplishment in my tasks... how do I measure success?

Glen comes to the realization that success for God cannot be measured by outcomes. Outcomes that work in the secular world...Returns on investment, profit margins, contact hours, office visits, billable hours, and time spent reading, these types of tangible quantifiers—do not always equal the outcome that we desire. A child can spend hours reading—and still not comprehend. Christian success—comes in the understanding that ministry loves company. **Developing relationships allows ministry to take place**.

Relationships start first with your relationship with Jesus. Mary knew this, and she eagerly sat at Jesus feet. You imagine her hanging on his every Word. Mary knew that Jesus needed a friend more than a good meal. Jesus needs your friendship too. Martha, on the other hand, missed out. She was setting her own agenda. It is easy to conclude that Martha wanted to make things perfect for Jesus—because she fully appreciated his identity as God's Son. It is more difficult for us to see in Martha those other parts of her personality that we don't want to see in ourselves. The parts of Martha that **resented** Mary's faithful devotion to God's son; the part of Martha that was **jealous** of Mary's ability to "get" God's message; The **embarrassed** part of Martha that was embarrassed that Mary, a woman, would have the audacity to call herself one of Jesus' disciples...let alone sit at his feet. These are the parts of Martha: the resentful, jealous, embarrassed parts—that we don't want to acknowledge in ourselves. Who do you keep at arm's length instead of loving?

Distractions. They keep us numb—they keep us from feeling and prevent us from really focusing on reality. The interesting thing about distractions—we think that we are hiding behind them—when in actuality—we become fairly transparent. From the kitchen, we still hear what is going on in the living rooms of our lives. We know what is there—that we, like Martha, want to avoid Jesus. Rather, ministry is successful when it equips people to live a courageous life. Mary courageously sat at Jesus' feet. She risked persecution in her society. She risked mockery by her sister. She practiced courage to be in the company of Jesus. So, now, should we.

It is true that we have chores to do. It is really true that I have a gazillion boxes to unpack. It is a reality that we have to make a living, prepare meals, and clean up the dishes. It is true that we choose to stay up for hours reading a new book. The greater truth, though, is that Mary chose the better part, "listening to God's Son," and that part will never be taken away from her.

Ministry loves company. Jesus needs yours. I need yours. *Let's help each other listen to Jesus together.*

As has been written in previous Bridge articles on this subject, Christian Stewardship is often misconstrued and misunderstood as being exclusively about financial giving to the church. The word "stewardship" is commonly defined as the prudent and responsible guardianship of something considered to be of great value that is entrusted to one's care. Understanding and practicing good Christian stewardship of God's gifts is a crucial expression of our faith in Jesus Christ as our savior. The Bible tells us, "*Like good stewards of the grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received.*" (1 Peter 4:10 NRSV)

As followers of Christ and stewards of these gifts, we are called upon to use them in service to God and our church.

There are countless opportunities to use our collective God-given gifts in service to the church. 
unable to drive, participating in our outreach and benevolence programs, assisting in fellowship functions, to name just a few. These examples represent stewardship in action.

NO BAKE COOKIES

3 c. quick cooking oats, uncooked
1/2 c. peanut butter
2 c. sugar
¹/2 c. butter
¹/2 c. milk
3 TBLS unsweetened cocoa powder
1 pinch salt
1 tsp. vanilla extract



Bring sugar, margarine, milk, cocoa, and salt to a rapid boil in a saucepan for 1 minute. Add quick-cooking oats, peanut butter, and vanilla and mix well. Working quickly, drop by teaspoonfuls onto waxed paper and let cool.

Outreach and Mission



Wednesday, May 15, was our last Habitat for Humanity lunch until September 18, 2024. The Habitat volunteers work only during the early morning hours during the summer to avoid the heat. The volunteers asked me to convey to you their appreciation for our support of their program as well as the delicious food that is prepared for them. So, I Thank You Very Much!!

We are working with the families of the Granbury Housing Authority on summer fun activities. We have offered one gift card per family to their choice of PINS Bowling Alley, Granbury Skate Rink, or Cinergy Movie Theatre, as well as a variety of food establishments; or a one-month membership to the YMCA. At the time I am writing this, I am waiting to receive their selections.

June will begin our annual Rack Room Gift card drive. We are requesting donations of \$25 gift cards to Rack Room Shoes. The gift cards will be collected throughout the month of June. You may place them in the offering tray, take them to the office, or simply write a check w/Rack Room Shoes in the memo line, and we will do the shopping. In July we will present the gift cards to the Rainbow Room, who will in turn provide them to foster parents. This enables the foster children to take part in choosing their school shoes for the coming year.

We have also provided Mission Granbury with a total of three "Laundry Baskets" so far this year. The Laundry Baskets are filled with items needed by persons leaving a shelter and moving into a new residence. We typically include a set of dishes, flatware, glasses, kitchen towels, bath towels, cooking utensils, and some basic cleaning supplies. A lot of the items included in the Laundry Baskets are items donated to the Rummage Sale, with some items purchased new. This is another way that we help support the community and other community agencies.
