Dear Friends,

Happy Easter! Yes, I know that Easter hasn't yet happened. April 20th marks another beginning for us as Easter People! I certainly hope that the brilliance of Christ's resurrection promises continue to make your heart beat a bit more rapidly long after the sunrise at Hewlett Park, 6:30 a.m.

Remember, Palm Sunday People, Easter People, are people who praise God all of the time. In a book that I cherish "The Heart's Journey Through the Seasons: The Circle of Life" the authors Joyce Rupp and Macrina Wiederkehr make the point that at any given time, all around us, there are many for whom the divine face of Christ remains a stranger.

One of the post-resurrection stories that I recall during this time of year comes from John 21: 1-14. The disciples were fishing at night. The next morning as the sun was breaking on the horizon a person begins talking to them from the shore. They do not recognize the person but nevertheless listen to the 'fishing advice' of this strange man. Only after they catch a great amount of fish does John cry out "it is the Lord!"

Jesus invited them to come ashore and have a morning brunch together. The people that we encounter in the world, who have not yet seen Jesus, need to be invited to his Light. The disciples were in the dark until that simple invitation to eat a quick meal on a charcoal fire showed them the Light. You are now the folks that Jesus is relying on to make that invitation. You are the ones that need to stand on the shores and notice the people who are floundering and in need of God's grace and love to the shores of understanding.

The Easter cry of "He is Risen!" needs to turn into your invitations to friends: "It is the Lord! He is here at Granbury First Presbyterian Church." Part of evangelism is having a party spirit. Jesus had one—he was ready to have a party on the beach. I've seen your party spirits—you all have gifts for entertaining, dining, eating, inviting—what's keeping you from being a party-planner for God? Party-On Presbyterians!

The traditions at First Presbyterian Church of Granbury can be comforting to visitors.



That afternoon is the time to finalize setup and pricing. The sale is on Friday April 4th 8am to 4pm and Saturday April 5th 8am to 2pm. There will be lots of wonderful items at bargain prices.

I love spring. Everything is turning green and flowers are showing off their beautiful colors. It's time for Easter and celebrating the resurrection of Christ.

I was thinking of decorations for Easter and was wondering how the Easter bunny came about being a part of Easter. After doing some internet searching, the long story short, is it really has nothing to do with the resurrection of Christ. German immigrants brought the folklore of a bunny named Oschter Haws. He would bring a present of eggs to the children. The children would make a nest for the bunny to place the eggs and they would sometimes leave carrots out for Oschter Haws to eat. Does this sound like a Christmas story? After what I read, my short version is that bunnies represent new life because they are so fertile. Eggs represent Christ coming to life and exiting the tomb. Christ gave the ultimate sacrifice so we can be reborn and have life not only on earth but in heaven.

We have a lot of activities this month. The rummage sale and Lenten studies every week. On Easter Sunday we are having a sunrise service at Hewlett Park followed by a continental breakfast before regular church service that day. We are also going to flower the cross in front of the church. If you would like to bring flowers to decorate the cross we will have people there to help with that. It is so beautiful when completed and we always have lots of people come by to take pictures.

During the Ash Wednesday breakfast several people commented on how good the casserole was and wanted the recipe so here it is.

#### GREEN CHILE QUICHE 10 eggs 1/2 c. flour 1 tsp baking powder 1/4 tsp salt 1/2 c. melted butter 8 oz canned chopped green chiles, drained 1pt small curd cottage cheese 16oz shredded Mexican or Monterey Jack cheese Preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Grease a 9 x 13 pan.



Break eggs into a very large bowl and whisk by hand. Blend in flour, baking powder and salt. (to avoid lumps, you can add some beaten egg to a bowl of the dry ingredients: mix well until smooth and then add back to the large bowl of eggs.) Add melted butter, green chilis, and cheese. Mix well. pour into the prepared pan.

Bake at 400 for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 and bake 25 - 30 minutes more, until golden brown on top and toothpick comes out clean. Cut into squares and serve hot. Enjoy!




In our March Bible Study, we discussed how the Bible's economic wisdom never promises to eradicate poverty, "You always have the poor with you" (Matthew 26:11) but we can reduce suffering and strengthen the entire social network. While studying for this lesson, I researched ways that the Presbyterian Church (USA) is working in the world to help those in poverty and found information on the Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People (SDOP). From SDOP's guidelines, their mission is stated in the following way:

SDOP is a ministry that affirms God's concern for humanity. We are Presbyterians and ecumenical partners, dissatisfied with poverty and oppression, united in faith and action through sharing, confronting and enabling. SDOP works toward the self-development and empowerment of economically poor, oppressed and disadvantaged people who seek to change the structures that perpetuate poverty, oppression and injustice.

The graphic below shows the grants that were awarded in 2024. These funds come primarily from funds received by One Great Hour of Sharing donations. To receive a grant, the recipient must abide by the following criteria:

- Be presented, owned, and controlled by the group of economically poor people who will benefit directly from it.
- Address long-term correction of conditions that keep people bound by poverty and oppression. This will utilize some combination of the SDOP core strategies to promote justice, build solidarity, advance human dignity, and advocate for economic equity.
- Be sensitive to the environment while accomplishing its goal(s) and objectives.
- Not advocate violence as a means of accomplishing its goal(s) and objectives.

As Presbyterian Women, we state in our purpose, that we will support the mission of the church worldwide and work for justice and peace. SDOP helps us to reach those goals. 

#### **MISSION SPOTLIGHT: ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING**

The OGHS offering is divided among three different PCUSA programs: Presbyterian Disaster Assistance - 32%; Presbyterian Hunger Program - 36%; and Self-Development of People - 32%. **Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA)** is the emergency and refugee program of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). It enables congregations and mission partners to witness to the healing love of Christ through caring for communities adversely affected by crisis and catastrophic event. **Presbyterian Hunger Program (PHP):** In 2023, PHP gave 84 grants totaling \$1.1 million, impacting 19 countries and a territory, including the U. S. and Puerto Rico.

**Self-Development of People (SDOP):** The Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People works with low-income communities to overcome oppression and injustice. Through your gifts to OGHS, projects in economically poor communities around the world have had an opportunity to develop solutions to their own challenges.

We will be receiving our One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) offering on Easter Sunday, April 20, 2025. If it is more convenient for you to give on another day or through other means than in-church offering, donations will be accepted throughout Lent. Offering envelopes will be in the pews or you can mark your check OGHS in the memo line.

#### MEALS ON WHEELS VOLUNTEERS ARE NEEDED

The Hood County Meals on Wheels program is in need of volunteers to deliver meals to the home-bound in our county. Ideally, a team will consist of two volunteers. The volunteers go to the Hood County Senior Center on E. Moore Street on Thursday morning at 10:30 a.m. They inventory the meals to ensure they have the correct number for their route. The delivery route is estimated to take between 60 to 90 minutes. Upon completion of the route, the team will return the containers to the Senior Center for the next day's use.

Currently they have all routes filled, however, they are always in need of people to substitute. An email is sent out to all volunteers who are not assigned a specific route. The email identifies the day and route needed to be filled. If a volunteer is available to take that day and route, the volunteer responds to the email and is scheduled.

If you have a few hours you can spare, please give consideration to this worthy program. There are many people in our community who are home-bound, some long-term, some for short-term recuperation. Oftentimes, the Meals On Wheels volunteers are the only one-on one interaction these people have on a daily basis. It is an opportunity to brighten someone's day as well as provide nourishing food they might not have otherwise. #### **RAINBOW ROOM SACK DRIVE**

April is the month when we observe Child Abuse Prevention Month. We also recognize the enormous service that the Rainbow Room provides to the Foster Children in Hood County. The Rainbow Room will provide us with bags which identify needed items. The estimated cost of donated items for each bag is \$20. Bags will be available in the Narthex beginning Sunday, April 6. Evangelism and Youth

The word *evangelism* conjures up a variety of feelings. For many older Christians it has a negative connotation. They may associate it with high-pressure tactics or are afraid of being expected to evangelize. Perhaps surprisingly, for many younger churchgoers, it is a term they have never heard. Still other people, who feel neither positive nor negative, are often bewildered because they don't know what the word means.

Unfortunately, the movie *Elmer Gantry* defined evangelism in America for the last half of the twentieth century. Gantry was the flamboyant evangelist, dressed in a white suit with white shoes, who railed against evil in his tent revival meetings. Away from the glitter of the lights, he sought out women for his selfish physical pleasure. He greedily pocketed the offerings, which he lavishly spent on big cars and personal joys.

But indeed, the word *evangelism* is a beautiful word, and the true evangelist is a wonderful person. Evangelism includes the word *angel* which means messenger. Etymologically, the "ev" comes from the greek prefix *eu*- which means "good"; for example, "eu" in eulogy means a good word, and in euphemism, a good sounding word. When the "eu" in Greek was put into English to make the word, *evangelism*, the *u* was made into a *v* which is called transliteration. So, what does evangelism mean? A good message. And an evangelist is someone who brings a good message. Speidel, Royal. *Evangelism in the Small Membership Church*. Nashville, Abingdon Press. 2007.

## Session Highlights

First Presbyterian Church of Granbury

The Session Spiritual Leaders met as a group of 13 in Fellowship Hall on March 18, 2025. We opened with a Devotion offered by Vanessa Faulkner.

A spiritual formation leadership moment on "Canoeing the Mountains" was offered by Rev. Madden. A team of Elders is working with Church Mutual on building claims. Church Mutual has paid FPC on a claim for hail damage from 2024. We are actively working with them on other claims for damages from additional storms. The team of Property and Administration are working together to secure insurance quotes from insurance providers as we have heard from the Grace Presbytery that Church Mutual may not renew insuring churches in the state of Texas. The Session will receive an update in April. Church Mutual sent a letter 3/20/25 that they will no longer cover the Historic Sanctuary. Pray for leaders working on options.

The Long-Range Planning Team's Columbarium Committee recommended a small increase to the price of a niche in the Columbarium. A niche may now be secured for \$1400 (a \$200 increase). FPC recently added 36 niches and expanded the ministry.

The Christian Education Committee moved successfully a motion for a bounce-water house for the closing day of Vacation Bible School July 18, 2025: Waves of Wonder.

Major E. Scott will be confirmed on Pentecost, June 8, 2025. His sponsor is Elder Kathy Long. Maundy Thursday Living Last Supper and Good Friday Tenebrae Worship Services will each be at 7 p.m.

June 1 we will have a craft fair featuring all of the artists in the Faith Family (who have items to showcase).
